During our annual welcome ceremony, the 57 students of the Class of 2026 received their white coats, a symbol of knowledge and compassion as they begin their DPT quest. After receiving their coats, the students recited their pledge to the profession. Faculty, upperclass students, clinicians and Virginia Physical Therapy Association representatives – along with family and friends – celebrated the incoming class.



In addressing the class, American Physical Therapy Association President Roger Herr, MPA, PT, shared learnings and experiences from his 35-year career. His contributions include implementing multiple post-acute care regulatory changes in home health, hospice and long-term care.

Leader receives APTA Minority Scholarship

Class of 2023 President **Jonathan Mack, DPT,** became the second VCU student to receive the APTA Minority Scholarship, awarded for professional character, academic excellence and positive impact on minority affairs. The VCU PT Sports resident volunteers in the CARES pro bono clinic.



Mack noticed growing diversity among his VCU cohort, which is important in caring for

patients from different backgrounds. "People come to you in a vulnerable state, where it's an injury or whatever they're dealing with, and you're going to have to take the time to learn about them," he said.



VCU wins the Marquette Challenge again

By raising more than \$25,000, VCU again took first place in the VCU-Marquette Challenge, which supports Foundation for Physical Therapy research. Each year's winner joins Marquette as co-host the following year, and VCU has finished in one of top two spots for the past seven years. VCU students have collected more than \$300,000 over the past 20 years, earning membership in the Champion Society. The challenge attracts 150 schools nationwide.

Hicks delivers Annual Lamb Lecture

Gregory Hicks, Ph.D., FAPTA, delivered this year's Robert Lamb Distinguished Lecture, established in 2012 to recognize an individual with significant contributions in PT research. Drawing on his research in improving function and activity in older adults, Hicks spoke on "Developing a Tailored Rehabilitation Approach for Geriatric Low Back Pain: Should We Focus on the Hip?" He is distinguished professor of health sciences and associate vice president of clinical and translational research at the University of Delaware.
